GEDA and GEDC seek to increase the ED workforce trained in geriatric emergency care in number and diversity and to increase the capacity of rural hospital centers. Doing so will address the unmet needs of a diverse older population.

GEDA and GEDC seek to understand and address the unique healthcare needs and challenges that diverse populations face to ensure that our services are culturally responsive, accessible, and equitable. Through our educational and implementation programs as well as the accreditation process, we will provide ongoing education and training to eliminate health disparities in underserved and historically marginalized communities.

GEDA and GEDC are committed to developing a framework in the future to evaluate data collection processes from accredited EDs. This will enhance our understanding of the diverse needs of older populations and ensure that the care provided is equitable.
